Parent Checklist for Recognizing an Authentic Montessori School

- 1. Ask the school representative if they are affiliated with any of the well-known Montessori organizations such as:
 - American Montessori Society (AMS)
 - Association Montessori Internationale (AMI)
 - Montessori Accreditation Council for Teacher Education (MACTE)
 - Pan American Montessori Association (PAMS)
- 2. Are lead teachers Montessori trained and certified or in the process of training at a Montessori teacher training center accredited by MACTE?
- 3. Is the school accredited?
- 4. Ask to see a Montessori classroom. You should see:
 - Open shelves with a full array of Montessori materials available to all students
 - A classroom setting designed to allow children to work independently or in small groups which allows for interaction of the children
 - o Open floor space to accommodate floor work and child-size tables for individual work
 - An aesthetically pleasing classroom. It should be neat, orderly, clean, peaceful, and attractive. You should not see clutter, disorganization, or an over-stimulating environment. You should not see traditional toys or play areas.
 - A multi-age mixture (3-6) (6-9) (9-12) years, etc.
 - A happy, positive atmosphere with children working independently and together
 - Children fully engaged with the Montessori materials
 - Children teaching and helping each other
 - A sense of calm, purposeful activity and peacefulness exhibited by the students and adults
 - Children are moving and working carefully and respectfully throughout the environment
 - Teachers working with individual students or very small groups on the floor or at a table
 - Teachers communicating and treating students with respect
 - A peace corner or table where students and teachers can use various techniques to instill positive problem solving and communication
 - Music instruments and an art area that are available to the students in the classroom
- 5. Does the school have outdoor gardens (butterfly, vegetable, etc.), and/or plants or terrariums in the classroom?
- 6. Does the school have age appropriate outdoor environments that offer an opportunity for free play and development of gross motor skills?
- 7. Are there classroom or school pets so that children may take part in the care and responsibilities of animals?
- 8. Does the school provide experiences with foreign language for the students?
- 9. Does the school have observation guidelines for adult observers?
- 10. How does the atmosphere of the school and classroom "feel" to you? Is it a match to your view of how education should be?
